

We now have six students at this time. The school is now in the process of applying to the state for a three- star rating. This will increase payment per child.
- ♦ January minutes for last months meeting were read and approved. Sandy Ferrell motioned Betsy Miller second.
- We have a court date of March 6th on our copier problem.
- ♦ Anyone may put articles in our newsletter The Red Door. Have them to John Glaze by the 20th of the month.
- Rev. Judi Wiley will be working on starting a new-comers group. Ushers need to encourage visitors to sign the book.
- ♦ Voting delegates for the annual convention are: Kyle Lawson, Bob Lowell, Kim Haines, and Judy Franklin. Anyone may attend the Convention. The annual convention will be held on November 8th and 9th at Roberts Center in Wilmington Ohio.

Where Are My Blessings? - Part 2

- **5.** There is unconfessed sin in your life. If you are being disobedient in your life or habitually sin, it messes up your relationship with God. His blessings are for those who love Him and surrender to Him and His ways. James tells us to "wash your hands and purify your heart and He will lift you up."
- **6.** You are being directly impacted by the company you keep. If you are being obedient and responsible, but the other one on your bank account isn't, there's the problem. God doesn't punish us, but we sometimes share the consequences of another's sin or irresponsibility. We get insnarled in their deceit. God's eyes are on the faithful.
- **7. Your prayers are for show.** Praying in public is not the time to show off. It's not the time to scold others, to gossip, or curry respect.
- **8. You put your faith in superstutious nonsense.** Don't put your faith in the power of your actions instead of the power of God. Don't repeat the same prayer over and over by rote! Matthew tells us "do not heap up empty phrases." The time or place of the prayer doesn't increase its effectiveness. You don't have to go to Israel to pray for peace in the Middle East.
- **9. There is insincerity in your prayer.** It's wrong to pray when you don't. mean it. Asking God to provide for your family when you have no intension to work, curb your spending or avoid debt is just irresponsible.
- **10. You forget to honor God.** Your prayer should praise God, worship God, and thank God for all he has done for you. There must be no other god in your life. Stay focused on the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. God loves you and wants the best for you, but it is in His time and pace
