

The Financial Committee and Vestry have worked out a budget for 2019. Only three three pledges have been given. We will go by faith.

(continued from page 2) Durr was born in Cincinnati and received his early education in the public schools there. He then went to Kenyon Military Academy in Gambier, Ohio, apparently for secondary school years. Later Durr attended Kenyon College in Gambier, graduating in 1892. His seminary training was also in Gambier at the Theological School of Kenyon (also known as Bexley Hall), and received his Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1894.

After his ordination in 1894, Louis Durr was in charge of two congregations in eastern Ohio, Zion Church in Dresden and St. Matthew's, Madison Township, Muskingum County, filling both pulpits for seven years. In 1900 Durr built a church at Madison Township, which, according to an account in the Cincinnati Enquirer, was the smallest church in Ohio at the time. It was constructed of rough stones gathered from the fields around the church yard, and had a seating capacity of about 100.

The diocesan magazine, "The Church Chronicle," for December 1905, included a rather lengthy report from St. Mary's, Hillsboro: "On the 25th of October this venerable and beautiful church celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of its consecration. The fact was not known in time to arrange for a fitting celebration of the event, but the services were simple, appropriate, and elevating. The rector made suitable mention of the event on the Sunday succeeding October 25th---reading the articles of consecration drawn up and signed by the scholarly Bishop McIlvaine. *(continued next page)*



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"It was proposed, and it is earnestly hoped that the proposition will eventually be accomplished, to commemorate the golden jubilee by erecting a complete parish house. Mr. Elzner, of Elzner & Anderson, has been consulted, and the people are being gradually educated up to the appreciation of the necessity of such an adjunct to the church. There is no place in Southern Ohio where a fully equipped parish house would do more good than in Hillsboro. It is a very wet-dry town of some five or six thousand inhabitants, where the young boys and girls have absolutely no place to spend their evenings under proper influences. It is almost a certainty that a parish house, with gymnasium, guild and reading rooms, would be doing the Master's work of making better citizens here and fitting them for citizenship in the world to come. Any friends of St. Mary's or benefactors of humanity, and especially those who are interested in keeping young men and women pure and clean, physically, and morally, as well as spiritually, will find this worthy object for the bestowal of their philanthropies.
