# SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

#### ALL IS WELL! HAVE A NICE SUMMER!

The above sentiment was going to be the theme of my article for the July Newsletter, but after giving it a little thought, I decided that I cannot tell a lie. All is not well in our heating and cooling system. On a recommendation from the Finance Committee, the vestry voted approval for Rev. Judy to contact the Diocesan Interfaith Power & Light organization and request a free energy audit for our old church building.

The facts are that we are faced with replacing one of the boiler units and trying to patch and repair the other as a back-up. The existing units were put in place around 1994 according to Paul Orth's research and history. What is the time line for installing a new boiler? What is the cost and how do we plan to pay for the boiler and installation? We are looking at installing a new unit in late September before we switch to heat from cooling. We are hoping that the Energy Audit will provide us with guidance and maybe resources available such as a grant to help pay the costs. The vestry and your leadership ask for input and guidance from you, the congregation, on how we might look at planning for and handling the cost of approximately \$10,000.00 if no grant funds are available.

Now, switching to a new lighter topic, it is time for us to form a Stewardship Committee to start planning for the an-

nual Fall Ingathering at St. Mary's. I am hoping that we can recruit a couple of people from the congregation to serve on the committee along with members of vestry. Please speak with Rev. Judi or me if this is something that you would like to do. Check out the bulletin board in Lacy Hall for a wish list of household items and other things such as linens etc., for the Highland County Homeless Shelter. Donations can be delivered directly to the shelter or call me if you have something to donate. We are a blessed congregation, so let's try to share our blessings with others in our community. See you in church and have a safe 4<sup>th</sup> of July.

# ACCENTUATE THE POSITIVE

All of these therapeutic approaches focus on *accentuating the positive*.



boosts immune system activity and lowers the amount of circulating stress hormones, such as adrenaline and cortisol.

If prayer is meaningful to you, it may help you to relax and enhance your health too. Several studies have shone that people with an active religious life tend to stay healthier, live longer and are happier. Paul tells us, "Be joyful always, pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Jesus Christ." (1Thes. 5:16)

If you could use more joy in your life, try Pastor Goodiers' advice:

- ♦ Spend time daily doing something you enjoy.
- Do those things that bring inner peace.
- Learn to laugh heartily and frequently.
- Cultivate an attitude of hope and gratitude.
- Fill each day with as much love as it can hold.

You'll still have problems and "bad hair" days, but you'll find all the joy you need.
