BUILDING COMMITTEE UPDATE


The committee started meeting in early March and we were given the charge from the Vestry to be the lead in getting the building project on track. I think if anyone takes a look at the present state of deconstruction of the house, you will see we are making progress. We have a committed team that has been meeting most Tuesdays since March to stay on our timeline.

What has been done to date?

- We have secured an architect who is moving forward with our blue-prints. We met with him last Tuesday to confirm final changes on plans.
- We received bids from four architects for the job. The committee chose Darin Schweickart, **DS2 Architects.** He came in with the lowest bid. He has worked with other churches who had similar projects. Also, he has done a lot of work for Highland County organizations.
- The ramp was removed from the back of the building and repurposed for a ramp on the south side of the entry to the church

building. This was completed two weeks ago.

- The asbestos siding was removed by a company specializing in asbestos removal. This was completed last week.
- The building has been emptied of all materials and contents. Thanks to Larry and Judy Wiley for offering their garage for storage. The storage moving was completed last Saturday.
- We now are contacting folks who might be interested in removing wood trim, flooring, doors, windows, and other things of value. This will hopefully be completed by the end of the month. Anyone interested??
- We have contracted with the Ford Excavation Company to do the building demolishment. This will occur in early June, hopefully. Everything depends on things beyond our control.
- The architect must finish the blueprints. We need a survey of property and building location. The Diocese meets on June 1st, the President of the Trustees of Diocese of Southern Ohio, Jon Boss, has been in contact with Rev. Judi. She sent them our proposal and he was very affirming. The request meets all of the parameters of the Martha Chaney Funds.
- So, we hope to have the blueprints from the architect and monies from the Diocese in early June. This will allow us to move forward with bids.
- All things look positive to date. Please be praying for God's blessings.
- Thanks to the committee: Jim Gee, Paul and Phyllis Johnson, Mildred May, Rev. Judi, and Bob Lowell.

Organ 101 - Part 2

This month we look at two more aspects of the pipe organ: the blower (or the lungs) and the way the air moves to the pipes. Before the discovery of electricity as a means of providing the power to operate a fan-like device creating a constant supply of air, organs were powered by human power. In smaller organs, this was usually a handle which was connected to a bellows and the human pumped it. If you have ever played (or have seen) a parlor, or reed organ, or a player piano, then you know the bellows system of pushing air through the pipes. In large cathedral organs, this could be a huge bellows which was operated by a human (or sometimes

even more than one) getting a cardio workout on a device similar to today's "stair-steppers".

St. Mary's was no different. When the organ was first installed around 1885, an individual was paid weekly to pump the air for the organ. Even after electricity came to town, it was so unreliable that the hand pump was kept in place. At First Presbyterian Church, inside the organ, the handle is still attached and ready for use (at least it was the last time I was inside the organ). On the console, there is a drawknob which does not turn on any of the stops. It is labeled "Bellows Signal" and simply created a clattering noise to alert the man pumping the organ that it was time to pump. On the wooden pipes inside that organ, one can read the names of the men who provided the pumping service and the dates on which they pumped. As I recall, they were paid 50 cents per Sunday.

At the time of the rebuild in the 1930s, a blower driven by an electric motor was installed in the basement. (Remember, the "new building" was only built in 1907 and there is no basement forward of the new building.) So, if you've noticed a register (in the little hallway outside the office) which looks like a cold air return register you may have in your home, that is where air begins its journey to provide a note of music. The air is pulled down into the crawl space and through a wall into the basement and goes through the fan which is run by a two horsepower motor. From there, it is pushed through a smaller pipe (to increase the pressure) and goes back though the wall of the basement into the crawl

space beneath the office and sacristy into the area beneath the sanctuary. Up until the console was rebuilt, the air split off and part went to the console with the rest going to the organ. The console originally utilized a pneumatic system to provide power for the piston system (this is the way stops can be preset for quick changes – more about pistons in a future article). After the rebuild, this branch of air was capped off so that all air goes to the organ.

Once the air reaches the organ, part goes to the swell division and part to the great division. Once there it is held in a reservoir, which is a large wooden box with a top attached to the bottom with a bellows type connector of wood and leather. This allows the maximum amount of air on hand for those times when much of the organ is played at the same time and keeps the tone from sagging for lack of air.

Smaller pipes lead from the reservoir to the wind chests beneath the pipes. (The wind chest is labeled "Air Supply" in the diagram above.) The diagram is depicting a "tracker" type organ which is powered by mechanical connections to open the valves and allow air to pass into the pipe. This method as well as the electronic method utilized by our organ will be more fully described in a future article. Once the air is released into a pipe, the sound is created and the air has completed its journey.
