Some important ways to support the leadership is to attend Sunday worship, to participate in the various outreach ministries, to give joyfully of time, talent and treasure to the ministry of our congregation, and to pray daily for the Holy Spirit to lead St. Mary's into the next phase of ministry.


John Joy convened an impromptu meeting of the parish leadership today to discuss the new guidelines

from the Diocese on Sunday worship. Many of the decisions for worship are now left up to each congregation Here is what was decided:

- ⇒ The wearing of facemasks is highly recommended. This recommendation extends to both singing and to coming forward for Holy Communion.
- ⇒ We now have permission to sing in worship, under the recommendation listed above.
- ⇒ We will continue to practice social distancing, with pews marked that are NOT to be used during worship.
- ⇒ Under a Diocesan directive, all but the Celebrant will receive Holy Communion under the form of Bread (Hosts) only. I am not sure when this particular directive will be lifted.

It has been a joy and a privilege to serve with you over the last eleven months, and I look forward to being with you in the summer months and beyond.

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Vestry Report

Here we are in May, and it appears summer is just about upon us. Perhaps by the time you read this the Diocese of Southern Ohio will have lifted most, if not all of the restrictions related to Covid 19. It seems like a long time ago that we were able to sing during the service, and enjoy fellowship and good food after the service! As noted in previous updates, please feel encouraged to return to worship in person and join us on Sundays! Please also be alert to information from Father David regarding the return of some additional and exciting activities he is planning for us.

Although it has been a frustrating journey so far, we do have some positive and future looking news to report regarding our building and its condition. There is a lot of information to communicate, so I will take these notes to update you completely on our HVAC issues. In the next month's newsletter, I will update you on the study we had completed by Reserve Advisors, a summary of the results, and what the results may mean long term for St. Mary's.

It's no secret our Sanctuary is cold in the winter. We were fortunate that Vestry member Charles Everhart last fall, during an attempt to get some routine maintenance done on our heating and cooling systems, discovered what appeared to be some poor workmanship and other issues. After 2-3 months of reviewing construction documents and having outside contractors and Diocesan consultants look at some of the work, it was clear that St. Mary's did not get what we paid for in several areas as contracted with the HVAC work. Attempts to reach the contractors got no response, so a legal firm in Cincinnati was contracted with to send a demand letter to the contractor. We eventually got a response and visit from the HVAC contractor in question, and his attorney and ours are trying to work out an agreeable settlement. The Vestry has been working on this for over five months now, and it will take more months before the issue is resolved. This is just one of several efforts that I pray demonstrates our efforts to improve communication among us, as well as demonstrate how seriously we take our responsibility to make sure that St. Mary's church is maintained properly and can continue to serve as a place where "the Lord can be worshiped in beautiful holiness" (my acknowledgement to Father David for this phrase, which I borrowed). We also just recently learned of the possibility that some of the floor joists under the sanctuary floor may need replaced. This may tie in with the HVAC corrections and improvements, but we are not sure at this point. With another winter only months away, I feel obligated to get the lack of heat addressed. Once the attorneys work out some kind of settlement arrangement, we will have a better idea of any costs involved.

Next month I will cover in more detail what the Reserve Advisors study has provided us. I will summarize the details of the priorities regarding dozens of maintenance items facing St. Mary's in the coming years, the costs involved, and our strategies to date on how to approach these issues. I will close by asking you to pray for St. Mary's and its members and staff, and consider those ways in which you might support these important efforts. As always, should you have any questions about your Vestry's work, please let one of us know.

More from JOHN JOY

As our Pilgrim Priest David pointed out in last Sunday's sermon, we are in the Easter season. Signs of rebirth in the natural world surround us, as the trees, shrubs, plants and grass come alive once again. Spring is here! Thanks to all who have ventured out and attended a recent service in person. It is a very pleasant sight indeed to see the church pews gradually fill up a little more as the weeks go by. Please be reassured that you are welcome to attend in person. All attendees wear masks (except when reading the Gospel or prayers), every other pew is closed so social distancing is in place effectively, only the Bread is offered at communion, and it is done so in a sanitary, social distanced manner. We believe the church on Sunday is one of the places where you could expect little to no exposure to the threat of Covid 19. In fact, at 23 May service, a show of hands revealed that every attendee was fully vaccinated!

As I reported last month, we have received as expected the Reserve Advisors report on our St. Mary's facilities. The Vestry will be discussing it further and reviewing it with the Diocese in the months to come; the seventy page report contains a lot of material to digest. The main items of interest in the report are a listing by year of the repairs and work needing done to maintain St. Mary's for the next 30 years and the costs associated with each year. The study also recommends what amounts of money (reserves) are needed each year to position the church properly to be able to afford the upkeep of the buildings and grounds. As more is learned about this study, I will be happy to provide more information. Work is continuing to try and seek a remedy to the recent HVAC issues, and we are hopeful some progress is being made.

One of the areas covered by the study was security and safety of the building and grounds. To help us learn more about the usage patterns at St. Mary's, we have placed a sign in sheet inside at both the Lacy Hall back door kitchen entrance and in the hallway from the main back parking lot entrance. For the next few months, we are asking any unscheduled visitor to sign in and sign out. Anyone coming in on "normally scheduled" times does NOT need to sign in. Anyone coming in and out at other times for any reason needs to sign in and out. This is also a common practice for many organizations so who is in the building is known in the event of an emergency. Your cooperation will be much appreciated.

With the leadership of Vestry member Rich Davis, a working budget for 2021 was prepared. After revision, the budget projects income of \$108,617 and expenses of \$111.857. This is a "bare bones" budget, with little extra allowances for unexpected expenses. It does not contain an allowance for the repairs and capital improvement pro-

jects needed by our facilities. For those of you who may not know, the budget is heavily dependent on interest from our endowments. In fact, only about 23% of the income is estimated to come from the congregation. The Vestry acknowledges that both needed repairs and congregational growth are top priorities for St. Mary's, and that financial situation must improve in the years to come for St. Mary's to continue its mission.
