

How do we keep the "Alleluias" in our life?

We build up all through the Lenten season toward a glorious Easter resurrection, with all it's meditation and quietness, and then we explode on Easter Sunday with "He is Risen!". Now what? How do we keep the momentum and keep our hearts joyful? Here's a few suggestions.

Let yourself dream. Dreaming opens us up to the possibilities of what God has for us. Living a life filled with positive, joyful thoughts make us want to shout "Alleluia!".

Give yourself permission. Permission to laugh, to cry, to be alone and be surrounded by your family. Give yourself to do what make you joyful!

Do something creative. When my kids were sad, or melancholy, I would get out the craft box! I ask them to make silly things and soon they were laughing and enjoying life! Create!

Do something you used to love as a child. Being childlike is a true remedy for recovering that joyfulness. Dance, swing, play, run and skip! Shout "Alleluia"!

Challenge yourself physically. Do yoga. Bend and stretch. Good for the soul and good for the bones!

Do something incredibly helpful for someone else. Teach someone to sing "Alleluia" and take a step towards being there for someone else.

HYMNAL 101 (continued)

Last time, we learned about the layout of <u>Hymnal 1982</u>. Now let's consider how we choose hymns for each Sunday? There is a committee who knows the service backwards and forwards as well as the scriptures for each Sunday. They list hymns which are appropriate for each Sunday in <u>Hymnal 1982</u>, <u>Worship, Love & Praise</u> and <u>LEVAS</u>. It is a wonderful time-saving resource, but there are a couple other similar publications available. Many of the hymns on the list are not familiar to our parish, so I usually stick with the tried and true hymns we have sung many times. Once in a while, I will find a very singable hymn in the list and introduce a new one to the congregation. That hasn't happened in a couple years, though. I do get a chuckle when someone stops at the organ and comments on the "new" hymn we sang that day. I then show them my copy of the hymn. The chuckle comes when I also show them all of the dates on which we have previously sung that hymn. (I note the dates on my copy of the hymn, as well as what we used the hymn for, such as Processional, etc.)

As you may have noticed, the Episcopal Church folks like to use the same hymn tune for multiple texts. If you will look up the Index of Tune Names which begins on page 949 and then look for the tune name **ENGELBERG**, you'll find this same tune is used three times in our hymnal—once in the Holy Baptism category, once in Praise to God and once in Jesus Christ Our Lord. When I see Engelberg as a choice appropriate for a Sunday, I usually will choose it—it is one of my favorite tunes. At the bottom of the hymn using Engelberg, we can learn that the tune was written by Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924). Looking at hymn 420, still at the end of the hymn, we can also learn that the text was written by F. Pratt Green who was born in 1903. By 1982, when our hymnal was published, he was still living. Now, if you look at the right side at the bottom of this hymn, you'll see 10, 10, 10 with Alleluia. Any idea what this is? This is the meter of the text. So, it tells us that there are three lines, each containing 10 syllables and then an added Alleluia. As I write this, I only have the congregation copy of the hymnal with me and this book does not contain the index listing the meter index, but I'm guessing my accompaniment copy may have that index. With this information, we can really mix things up and find another hymn tune with the same 10, 10, 10 marking and we could use these words with that music, or this music with those words. Confused? The same principle can be applied to AMAZING GRACE. The words of this song can be sung to many other tunes, such as the theme song to Gilligan's Island or The House of the Rising Sun! Really! Give it a try. Entertain the family!

A hymn we sang on April 7 was number 382, "King of Glory, King of Peace" is one of my favorites, both text and music. We find that the tune, **GENERAL SEMINARY**, was written by David Charles Walker, who was born in 1938. The text was written by George Herbert (1593-1633). The text is what draws me to this hymn. If we would like to find more of George Herbert's poems set to music, we can go to the Authors, Translators and Sources index, which begins on page 936. Looking up Mr. Herbert, we find there are four additional texts by him in our hymnal. (Actually, only three additional texts, as the same text is used with two different tunes.)

When we sing a hymn on Sunday, we often just sing the words without really processing them and considering the whole text. I want to end this lesson with the text from hymn 382 where you can read these beautiful words and reflect on how they express praise as well as shout a testimonial to the world.

KING OF GLORY, KING OF PEACE King of glory, King of peace, I will love thee; And that love may never cease, I will move thee.
