Christ criticized the Pharisees and the scribes for calling attention to their meticulous giving while at the same time disregarding the "weightier matters of the law." At no time were the first-century Christians commanded to pay tithes. Instead of giving fixed amounts, Christians were to contribute "according to what a person has," giving "as he has resolved in his heart, not grudgingly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

Some people treat financial stewardship as a kind of "membership dues" to make the budget. Then there are those who know that all we have belongs to God. They give generously out of thanks. They give first to honor all that He's done for us. They come to worship God first and enjoy the fellowship as a fruit of their action. They share the joy that God is in us and pray that we raise a Holy Church to do what He calls us to do, minister to one another, the community, and the body at large.

Since joining the church thirty-three years ago, Fred and I have been "first-fruits givers." We are proud to be part of God's family and we give out of thanks for all the grace He extended to us. To those who are given much, much is expected. We received more and more of

Around 55—that's the approximate attendance for the first MUSIC AT ST. MARY'S CONCERT. Not bad, but I would certainly like to see better. Some people tell me they don't read the local papers. We have no local radio station. How can we get the word out? If you have ideas on this, please let me know!

The next concert is coming up this month: A Concert of Early Music presented by Collegium Musicum and My Musical Friends, both from Wilmington College. What can you expect to hear? Madrigals and motets, lively dance music, music of voices as well as music played on early music instruments, such as recorders.

The director of these groups is Elizabeth (Liz) Haskins. I knew her in 1968 as Liz Brookie. We were both in the All Ohio Youth Choir and traveled to Europe together in

the Europe Touring Choir that summer. (We had been in the State Fair Choir in 1967, however, with about 350 in the choir, you don't get to know everybody.) Now, flash forward to the late 1970s and Lynn Lowell would tell me about "Elizabeth Haskins" who was a voice teacher with Wilmington College. I pictured a blue-haired elderly lady and seldom thought more about it. One day, Lynn said she'd been talking to Elizabeth Haskins and had mentioned my name and Mrs. Haskins had said that she thought she might know me. Then Lynn mentioned the Youth Choir. At that point, I asked if she might go by the name "Liz" and if her maiden name was Brookie. It all turned out to be the case and that's how I came to find out that the "blue-haired lady" I had imagined was actually a much younger gal with red hair!
