MARIE THOMPSON RIVES

In our possession is an interesting little booklet written by Marie Thompson Rives. She was born to Judge James Henry Thompson and Eliza Jane Trimble. James was born 27 Sep 1812 to John Burton and Nancy Roberds Thompson in Kentucky. At 17, James began teaching at Jassamine College in Nicholasville and later began his law studies and was admitted to the bar in 1831. He took over his father's law practice when he died, but abandoned it in 1835 when a cholera epidemic moved through the area. He then opened an office in




Versailles and stayed there until he married.

Eliza Jane Trimble was born 24 Aug 1818 to Mr. & Mrs. Allen Trimble. At 19, she became the first woman to ever attend a temperance meeting when she accompanied her father to Saratoga, New York to attend the Temperance Convention. In 1819, Mr. Trimble began building a new home for the family. It is located about 1/2 block from St. Mary's on what is now an alley behind the banks. At the time of the building, their front yard extended down to North High Street and the back yard to North East St. It is commonly referred to now as the "Mother" Thompson house. As you probably know, responding to a call to action against alcoholism, which was rampant at the time, "Mother" Thompson became one of the leaders in the Women's Christian Temperance Union. Alcohol was dispensed at practically every establishment in town. One could visit the hardware store, or druggist and be served a drink. As a result of the lack of liquor control, many men became derelicts, using their pay for alcohol and causing families to suffer as a result.

The common notion today is that Prohibition was started by bands of prudish women who simply did not approve of alcohol and determined to rid the world of the evil, when, in fact, the problem actually affected many more families than it (continued on page 4)

As Trimble served as Governor of Ohio, his home was frequented by such well known people as Ebenezer Buckingham, Henry Clay, Governor Thomas Worthington, Rutherford B. Hayes and others.

James and Eliza had eight children. Of interest to this article is daughter, Marie Davis Thompson, who was an 1866 graduate of Hillsborough Female College. She was the wife of Dr. Edward Rives, whose sister Marie, gave the organ at St.

Mary's in his memory.

Their other children were: Allen Trimble Thompson, who served two terms as President of Hillsboro Female College; Anna Porter Thompson, who died at age 19; John Henry Thompson, who only lived a few months; Joseph Trimble Thompson, Mary McArthur Thompson, an 1867 graduate of Hillsboro Female College, was a portrait painter; Henry Burton Thompson, a graduate of Ohio Medical College and James Thompson.

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WHAT IS THE " WALK TO EMMAUS?

The first Cursillo, which was what came before Emmaus, took place on an open hillside in Spain (some reports say Majorca) in 1947. In the early 1980s, servicemen who had been stationed in Europe brought back to the United States the Cursillo experience they had had over there. This developed into the Walk To Emmaus, which is now overseen by THE UPPER ROOM organization in Nashville, TN.

The Walk to Emmaus is a structured experience and each community signs a covenant with the folks in Nashville to adhere to the program as it is outlined in the guidelines, or "model". Therefore, whether one takes their walk in Indiana or in India, he or she gets the same experience.

The ultimate goal of the Walk, which is intended for good, strong Christians, is to build up stronger members of the local congregation who will go back into their home churches and step up into leadership roles, or at the least become stronger members. How is this accomplished?

Through non-threatening situations, men and women are encouraged to ease out of their comfort zones and begin to find that speaking in front of others is not as challenging as many people find it. There are many who attend the Walk who are already extremely comfortable in a leadership role. One of the interesting features of the Walk is that there is no "pat" response to the weekend. Each attendee will find his or her own bright, shining moment of the weekend. If there are thirty pilgrims on the weekend, there are often thirty different experiences and responses.

What happens during the Walk? The structure is based on the presentation

of fifteen talks. Five of these are presented by clergy and deal with different facets of God's grace. The remaining ten talks are presented by lay persons and cover topics such as Priority, Grow Through Study, Life in Piety, Perseverance and Christian Action. Each presenter of a talk uses a basic outline which is part of the model. He or she expands the outline with personal experiences, illustrations and testimony. During the time of team preparation, each person who will be presenting a talk previews that talk at a team meeting. The team then critiques the talk, verifying that all points of the outline have been covered as well as providing suggestions for improvement of the talk.

In addition to all of this, prayer is a crucial part of not only the weekend, when there is at least one person praying during each of the 72 hours of the walk. Often there will be multiple folks bathing each hour of the weekend with prayer. An online prayer vigil chart provides folks across the country and around the world the honor of entering their names and supporting the weekend with their prayers. This has been very popular with folks who have experienced the walk and are now shut-in. This allows them to participate regardless of physical limitations or distance between themselves and the walks for which they pray. In addition, each time a talk is presented, friends and family of the presenter, themselves also members of the Emmaus community, will come to the church to pray during the talk.

The old saying that, "When Emmaus meets, Emmaus EATS!", is certainly true during a walk weekend. Meals are lovingly prepared by volunteers of the Emmaus community who give their time to travel to the walk site to prepare and serve a meal. Snacks are available nearly all the time! It's a hard time to stick to a diet!

Rounding out the weekend are times of singing, a lot of fun and many special moments.

To attend a Walk, one must be sponsored by a member of the Emmaus community. We have many folks in our parish who have attended a walk weekend and would be honored to sponsor you on a walk weekend. You must be committed to spending from Thursday evening until Sunday evening at the Walk site. The experience calls for attendees to give up contact with the outside world, which means leaving cell phones, pagers, watches, etc., at home. This allows the focus to be on one's relationship with God. Please consider giving yourself this exceptional experience!

As a side note, the Episcopal Church has a similar experience called Cursillo. Peggy Larkin and Susan Price went through Cursillos. Unfortunately, we are not aware of any active Cursillo communities in our area. Emmaus Walks and (continued on next page)

WEDNESDAY HOLY EUCHARIST with HEALING PRAYERS: 12:00 noon Cursillos are offered as Men's Walks and Women's Walks. Once you have gone on a weekend, you will understand why men and women are not combined.

Chrysalis is basically Emmaus on steroids and is geared toward teenagers. Talks are geared toward dating and other topics more meaningful to teens.

A very similar, but different in significant ways, is a program called Kairos. This is a prison ministry with many similarities to an Emmaus Walk. Volunteers who serve with Kairos spend much more time within the prison, however. Follow-up is intense and there are weekly meetings which support the prisoners in their desire to make a great change in their lives. Studies have shown that men and women who have had the Kairos experience have a significantly lower rate of recidivism than non-attendees. In addition, when those folks leave the prison environment, they have a wonderful support system outside the prison walls.
