Sords has received numerous awards and distinctions reflecting his career trajectory, including the 2012 Pittsburgh Concert Society Career Grant and the 2005 National Shirley Valentin Award.

Born in Newark, Delaware, Sords was raised in Shaker Heights, Ohio, and asked for piano lessons at age five. A year later, he began studying violin.

Elizabeth DiMio is accompanist for Mr. Sords.

The Duo's program will include works by Beethoven, Brahms and Sarasate.
