Last month we took a look at our Worship experience together. Now I want to walk us through the Holy Communion with God.

Holy Communion is an ancient command from Jesus to connect each of us to God. We pray for the Lord to come to us at the table. We suggest to each other that we lift our hearts up to our Creator. We profess that all is right to give thanks and praise to God. It is not only right, but it makes us right with God.

And we are to come to the table joyfully and recognizing our Father Almighty as Creator of heaven and earth. We call to God in praise, joining our voices with the Angels and Archangels and each other. The Angels and Archangels constantly praise God in their heavenly space. Then, together, we sing out to God, "Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might". We are not just voicing these words, but singing to our God. The whole book of Psalms gives us ancient songs that moved and directed early Christians and Jews to face their God in reverence. Sing as if God is standing in front of you!

We cross ourselves as a reverent gesture to remind us of God's special place in our lives. Each time we say "Blessed" it is ok to cross your chest as a sign of respect to our God.

Then we continue our praise by remembering how God loves us, and how God shows that love for us. We remind ourselves that God

sent Jesus to give us the Words of God so we might understand that love. We are reminded that Jesus was human, as we are human, to be part of our lives here on earth. And, that Jesus died so we would have forgiveness of sins.

A Word from Our Rector

Now the Priest picks up the bread, the symbol of the sacrifice of Jesus' body through death for us. We are reminded of that night as Jesus sat with his disciples and shared the sacredness of what was to happen to him the next day on the cross. The disciples didn't fully understand but we do because we know the end of the story. Jesus invites them to eat the bread, as he would, to unite them to the reality of the common (continued on page 2)

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

It is September and the beginning of fall is just around the corner and our thoughts at St. Mary's turn to our old heating system and wonder whether we can make it through another winter. For most of this past winter and spring we limped along with only one of our two boilers functioning properly. Paul Orth, our unofficial authority on the heating and cooling system, and a member of our vestry, presented a report to the vestry at our May meeting. Paul had met with our furnace repairman, Lance Ferneau, who was working for Weller Plumbing when the current system was installed in the 1990s and was the designer of the electronic control system, to discuss what our options are as to repair as well as replacement options. Results from that meeting were that Paul gave approval to repair and do what is necessary to bring the big round cooling tank behind the church (on the alley) back to where it becomes operational once again and can be used to supplement the cooling system. We must replace one of the two boilers this fall so that we have heat through the winter months! The estimate provided from Lance for the cost of installing a new modern and more efficient boiler will be approximately \$9545.00. The second boiler will serve as a backup to the new boiler.

How do we pay for a new boiler? This is the dilemma that was the topic of discussion at our August vestry meeting. Do we submit a grant application to the Diocese? Do we borrow the funds as a loan from a bank? Do we draw down the principal of our PNC Endowment Account? Do we ask the congregation to participate in a fund raising effort to pay for the new boiler? Do we do a combination of one or two of these options? I am asking for your advice and guidance. Please let me know what you think we should do, because the decision has to be made soon. It is hoped that the new boiler replacement can take place the end of September while we are in transition from cooling to heating the church. Please join me in praying for the future existence of our

cause. Then, in turn, Jesus offers the chalice of wine as he did the bread.

Next we identify the mystery that is the basis of our faith. We state; "Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again." If we did not believe this there would be no reason to celebrate Jesus' death. The incarnation of Jesus Christ is the basis of our Christian Faith.

The final step that sanctifies the meal we are to share, making it beyond special, is for the Priest, under the direction of the Bishop and with authority given by God at her ordination, blesses the bread and wine. This transforms our life in Christ into an authentic passage connecting us to the divine.

The Lord's prayer is said, joining our voices together in community, and we prepare for our gift of Bread and Wine, from the hand of God. Taking a small blessed piece of bread, and drop of wine, and eating it, transforms us from ordinary humans to divine humans. You will never be the same again. It is that important. When you have experienced this gift of love from God, and realize what you have done, you will cherish it forever.

As Episcopalians, we get to enjoy God's meal quite often. Some have asked me why we serve Communion so often, and I can only smile. If it were not for Holy Communion, I would not be a Priest. For it is in the sharing and serving of the bread and wine, that I feel most connected to God. I hope you do too.

HISTORY LESSON (continued from page 1)

Two hundred acres of land, on the highest point in the county, were purchased from Benjamin Ellicott for one hundred dollars, and a deed given on the 7th September 1807. On this plat of ground the town was located, named Hillsborough by the court, and made the seat of justice for Highland County.

A public sale of town lots was made 1st October, 1807, and the purchasers were from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and Kentucky.

The town of Hillsborough was incorporated as a village on the 7th February 1814. A second and amended act of incorporation bears the date 18th February 1848.

The first step toward erecting a building for St. Mary's was the appointment of Isaac Sams and J. Milton Boyd at the Vestry meeting of Dec. 31, 1853, as "a committee to negotiate for a lot on which to erect a church."

The Wardens, serving as the committee to negotiate for a Church lot, reported to the Feb. 11, 1854 Vestry meeting that they had purchased a lot. Lot 37 was subsequently purchased from Mathew W. Lane, and is the lot on the south east corner of North High and East North Streets, where the church was built. The previously purchased lot was No. 54, on the west side of South High Street just south of the first alley south of West Main Street. The Vestry took action on March 25, 1854 "to sell the east part of In-lot No. 54, purchased of Joseph Hiestand, to Mr. Wm. O. Collins for the sum of sixteen hundred dollars, said Collins to meet the payments to become due on the lot, and to pay the said Parish the remainder (\$450.) within nine months."

As far as can be ascertained from Vestry minutes and correspondence, there was no cornerstone laying or ground breaking to mark the beginning of the actual construction of St. Mary's building, but the initial laying out of the grounds for the start of excavations for the foundations took place on Good Friday, April 14, 1854. In a postscript to a letter to J. Milton Boyd dated April 12, 1854, the Cincinnati architect wrote: "Please to let the person who is to undertake the excavation have all his lines, stakes and everything ready for me to stake out the ground on Friday morning. By having everything ready we can manage it easily before the train leaves."

Although our actions have nothing to do with our salvation, they may be used by God to save someone else! What we do really matters, and it can affect the eternities of the people we care about.

Would you trust a stranger with your eternity? Probably not! You can't expect others to believe you if they don't know you. Pastor Hybels introduces his "Barbecue-First Principle." Get to know your neighbors and co-workers, the mothers in your child's play group, your Frisbee golf team. Invite them over for coffee or a barbecue. First become friends, then share the good news—that's what friends are for!

Remember—the same power that raised Christ Jesus from the dead is living in you. (Romans 8:11)

For we are God's masterpiece. For He has created us anew in Christ Jesus so that we can do the good things he planned for us long ago. (Ephesians 2:10)

And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him. (Romans 8:28)
